Welcome to this week's newsletter.

Sorry to have to mention this again, please can I remind parents and carers about appropriate clothing for PE day on Friday. Children should be in navy blue, grey or black shorts or jogging bottoms with a white T shirt. Hooded tops or jumpers may be worn, but no sports logos please. School jumpers or cardigans are appropriate wear. Please can we ensure children are in full PE kits each week, no Adidas, Nike etc. Children will be asked to change into a school PE kit next week in school if they have incorrect kit.

In school this week, our subject leaders have been spending time checking what knowledge children have remembered from their learning in the autumn term. Children have then been taking part in retrieval activities including quizzes, Kahoots and ClickView to consolidate past learning. We have been very impressed with children's retention.

Our Y2,3,4 children took part in a planting workshop with the Woodland Trust this week. We travelled by coach to the old golf course near Frodsham Hill. As a collective group, children dug holes and planted 165 trees! WOW! That was in the cold with blustering wind. We learnt that in about 40 years, the trees will have grown to full size. The Woodland Trust will be based their again this Saturday (27th) 10-3pm and any family is welcome to attend for free to help plant more trees.

A huge well done goes to our Y5 and Y6 children who attended a sports event at the leisure centre this week. They competed in many different sporting events against other local schools. They represented our school exceptionally well and showed great determination and resilience.

ClickView seems to be working very well. We have been checking each day to see how many children have engaged with videos at home and how many children have completed their homework and answered the interactive questions. Homework should be complete by Thursday each week. Videos will be either to support future learning or consolidate past learning. But remember, children can watch anything else available on their dashboard. Newsround has been a favourite as well as Horrible Histories.

I have confirmed the booking with KCR coaching who will deliver a football camp for two days during the February half term. We finish school on Friday 9th February.

CLICKVIEW

With money raised from the last Bingo night we have purchased the online app ClickView.

ClickView has a bank of educational videos, TV documentaries, Newsround and also allows continued access to the Disney Channel. Children can explore ClickView independently as all clips on there will be age appropriate and are curated to only allow children to watch things within their age limit. Videos link to all areas of the National Curriculum but also allows children time to watch things of interest to them personally. Videos such as Beauty and the Beast, Nemo and Home Alone are all available on ClickView. Educationally, children can also consolidate their learning on adjectives, verbs, nouns and mathematical concepts. Children can watch clips about their favourite history topic or learn about the wider world though geography linked clips. If there is something you find your child struggles with at home, type into the search bar and try and find a linked video for children to watch. Many of the clips are interactive with questions for the children to answer as they go through.

This week, teachers have set homework on ClickView for each child. You should see this in your child's dashboard when they log in.

Children should all have come home with their log in details so that they can access this from home. We hope you enjoy!

If you have any problems accessing from home, please call into school and a teacher will demonstrate how to set it up.

Learning this week...

This week Snowy Owls have planned and started to write their own superhero stories. Year 1 have been looking at the language features in the example text to support them with what they need to include in their own writing. Reception have been practising to retell the story. In Maths this week Reception have been developing their vocabulary when talking about height. They have been using tall, short, taller, shorter, tallest and shortest to describe the objects around our room and to order the superheroes too. Year 1 have been looking at making fact families using their known addition and subtraction facts for bonds to and within 10. They have also started to think about how using the inverse can help them solve missing number problems too. In Science this week we have been looking at grouping objects through observation of how they can change. For example, when stretched, ripped, twisted or bent. Another brilliant week! Well done Snowy Owls!

This week in Hawk Owls we have had lots of extra-curricular enrichment! On Wednesday we were invited by the Woodland Trust to help them plant a variety of saplings in Frodsham woods. They were expecting us to plant between 30 - 60 however the children managed to plant 165! We learnt all about the types of trees we had planted and look forward to visiting again in the future to see how they are growing. On Thursday we took part in a workshop all about the dangers of Carbon Monoxide poisoning in the home. The children learnt about the symptoms to look out for and what to do if they think there is a Carbon Monoxide leak at home. Progress continues to be made in swimming with nearly all children having a go without aids to support them. Well done everybody. In English we have completed our invention narratives and in maths looked at partitioning when doubling and halving larger numbers. We have also started to learn about the Bronze age in History.

On Friday in PSHE, we looked at first aid and how to put people into the recovery position. Children have also been spending time playing with our 'egg swivel chair' that was bought with the money we raised at the Christmas fair. Children have also completed more learning on their geography topic of 'the UK', this week children we able to consolidate their understanding of the countries that make up the UK, their capital cities and the seas that surround it.

environment that's suitable for ýoung children. This app is easily accessible and avaiĺable for mobile devices, which can be downloaded without needing the YouTube app on the device. Despite YouTube
Kids seeming like a very child-friendly platform, it has raised concerns over its advertising and inappropriate content seeping through the curation process.

Download the YouTube Kids app and connect your own YouTube channel.

SETTING

Input your child's name, age and birth month.

Select the types of videos you want to include for your child based on their age and your own personal choice.

If you decide to approve the content yourself, the app will present you with sample videos for you to accept and reject.

Once you've made your choice, you're ready to use the app!















REMOVE ADVERTISEMENTS

Like YouTube, adverts on YouTube Kids are also quite pervasive. If you decide you don't want your child being exposed to adverts, you can subscribe to YouTube Premium which will remove adverts on YouTube Kids. However, it's worth remembering that this doesn't block adverts that content creators decide to make as part of their content, and children are still able to access channels from branded fast food or toy companies.

RESTRICT VIEWING TIME

YouTube Kids has a far lower chance of showing unsuitable material than YouTube, but there are still reports of malicious users deliberately uploading inappropriate content. It's important that your child feels able to talk to you if they were ever exposed to upsetting content in the future. It's also safest to report inappropriate videos: tap the three dots in the corner of the video and select 'Report'. MONITOR WATCH HISTORY

BE WARY OF UNSUITABLE CONTENT

DISABLE SEARCH OPTION

YouTube Kids allows you to disable the search feature, which you may find useful in preventing your child from unintentionally finding age-inappropriate content. Doing this will also give you more control over what your child is watching. It's also worth noting that setting an age limit will ensure that your child is only exposed to recommended videos that are deemed suitable for their age group.
